WHAT DOES FIRST STATE INSURANCE DO WITH YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION?

Why?

Insurance companies choose how they share your personal information. Federal law gives consumers the right to limit some but not all sharing. Federal law also requires us to tell you how we collect, share, and protect your personal information. Please read this notice carefully to understand what we do.

What?

The types of personal information we collect and share depend on the product or service you have with us. This information can include:

Social Security number

Date of birth and driver's license number

Insurance score

How?

All insurance companies need to share customers' personal information to run their everyday business. In the section below, we list the reasons insurance companies can share their customers' personal information; the reasons First State Insurance chooses to share; and whether you can limit this sharing.

To limit our sharing

Please note:

If you are a *new* customer, we can begin sharing your information 30 days from the date we sent this notice. When you are *no longer* our customer, we continue to share your information as described in this notice.

However, you can contact us at any time to limit our sharing.

What we do	
How does First State Insurance protect my personal information?	To protect your personal information from unauthorized access and use, we use security measures that comply with federal law. These measures include computer safeguards and secured files and buildings.
	We also restrict access to nonpublic personal information about you to those employees who need to know that information to provide productor services to you.
How does First State Insurance collect my personal information?	We collect your personal information, for example, when you
	Ask for a quote or submit an insurance application Pay your premium or make deposits or withdrawals from your account Submit a claim
	We also collect your personal information from others, such as credit bureaus, affiliates, or other companies.
Why can't I limit all sharing?	Federal law gives you the right to limit only
	sharing for affiliates' everyday business purposes—information abo your creditworthiness affiliates from using your information to market to you sharing for nonaffiliates to market to you
	State laws and individual companies may give you additional rights to limit sharing. See below for more on your rights under state law.
What happens when I limit sharing for a policy I own jointly with someone else?	Your choices will apply to everyone on the policy – unless you tell us otherwise.
Definitions	
Affiliates	Companies related by common ownership or control. They can be financial and nonfinancial companies.
	Our affiliates include financial companies, such as Tri-County Financial Group, Inc., First State Bank, and First State Mortgage.
Nonaffiliates	Companies not related by common ownership or control. They can be financial and nonfinancial companies.
	First State Insurance does not share with nonaffiliates so they can market to you.
Joint marketing	A formal agreement between nonaffiliated financial companies that together market financial products or services to you.
	First State Insurance doesn't jointly market.
